PTE. ALEXANDER M. GRAHAM, infantry, wounded in action, is a son of Mr. and Mrs. G. T. Graham, of Merlynston. Before joining the AIF he was employed at the flour mills of John Darling and Son, and also by Hume Steel Ltd. He is known in Natimuk and district, and is an accomplished bandman. He embarked in April, 1941. His wife lives in Learmonth st., Moonee Ponds.

PTE. ROBERT H. HILL, 24, previously reported missing, is a prisoner of war, and in hospital in Germany, presumably wounded, according to advice received by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. A. Hill, Beach st., Long Island, Frankston.

PTE. JACK PARRY, killed in action at Tobruk, on May 17, was the eldest son of the late Mr. and Mrs. H. Parry, Malvern and Camperdown. He was keenly interested in sport, and was a member of the Camperdown Fire Brigade and Terang Anglers' Club. A brother is in the AIF and another in the RAAP.

PTE. T. WILLIAMS, reported wounded in action, is a son of Mrs. V. Williams, Tynabb. He was educated at Haileybury College, and before enlistment was a jackeroo at Jerilderie, NSW. His father, Lieut. L. M. Williams, was killed in the last war.

L.CPL. R. B. WHITE, Ivanhoe, killed in action, was educated at Ivanhoe SS and Collingwood Technical School. He played cricket and baseball, and served with the Militia in 57/60th Batt. for 3½ years before enlistment in AIF in May, 1940. He sailed for overseas in October.
